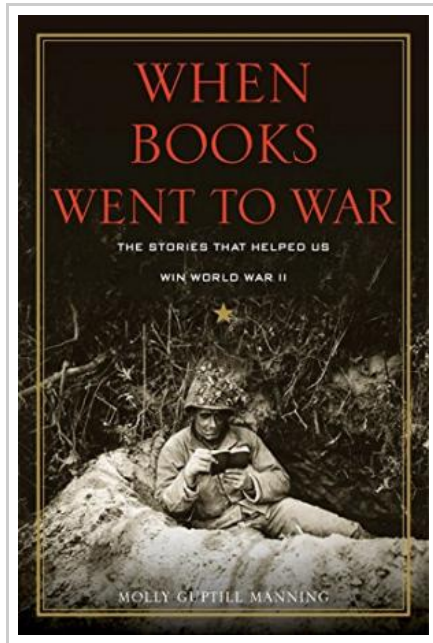

In response, librarians launched a campaign that sent millions of donated hardcover books overseas with our troops, but something more was needed. Here the author of *The Myth of Ephraim Tutt* recounts how the War Department and the American publishing industry stepped in with an extraordinary program, ultimately producing 120 million small, lightweight paperbacks that could easily be carried in a pocket or pack. These Armed Service Editions helped rescue *The Great Gatsby* from obscurity, and made Betty Smith, author of *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*, into a national icon. Soldiers read the books in chow lines, in foxholes, and in field hospitals; they also wrote to the authors many of whom responded to every letter and returned home to help build a literate middle class.
